# Miss Messenger Bag

This casual cross-body bag is the perfect partner for the girl on the go. Spacious enough for travel documents and reading matter, it keeps your hands free as you do a bit of shopping in the airport. I have fused the fleece to the lining fabric this time, to reduce bulk and make the zip insertion on the outer bag neater.

## Finished size

With flap open, 12½ x 15in (31.75 x 38cm) With flap folded over, 12½ x 10½in (31.75 x 26.75cm), not including strap

## What you need

36 x 18in (91.5 x 45.75cm) outer fabric 40 x 9in (101.5 x 23cm) faux leather

26 x 18in (66 x 45.75cm) lining fabric 26 x 18in (66 x 45.75cm) fusible fleece

Two 1in (2.5cm) D-rings

Two 1in (2.5cm) swivel snap hooks

10in (25.5cm) nylon zip

6in (15.25cm) of ¼in (5mm) wide ribbon to trim the zip pull

Magnetic clasp

Fabric glue pen

#### Cut

Two pieces of outer fabric measuring 13in (33cm) square

Two pieces of faux leather measuring 13 x 5in (33 x 13cm)

For the lining, two pieces of lining fabric and two pieces of fusible fleece measuring 13 x 17in (33 x 45.25cm)

For the pocket, two pieces of outer fabric measuring 10 x 8in (25.5 x 20.5cm)

For the strap, one piece of faux leather measuring 4 x 40in (10 x 101.5cm)

For the handles, two pieces of outer fabric measuring 4 x 11in (10 x 28cm)

For the tabs, two pieces of outer fabric measuring 4 x 3in (10 x 7.5cm)



Sew a piece of faux leather to the bottom of each of the outer fabric pieces. Press the seam open and topstitch along each side of the seam. You will need to put a cloth over the seam when pressing so as not to melt the coating on the faux leather.

2 Take one of the pocket pieces and on the back, draw a box measuring 8 x ½in (20.5 x 1cm), centrally, 1½in (4cm) from the top. Draw a line straight through the centre of the box, and create a 'Y' shape at each end.



## Finished size

14½ x 12½ x 5½in (37 x 31.75 x 14cm), not including handles

## What you need

54 x 18in (137 x 45.75cm) outer fabric 54 x 18in (137 x 45.75cm) lining fabric 45 x 18in (112 x 45.75cm) fusible fleece 15 x 5in (38 x 13cm) mesh bag base Four bag feet

90in (228.5cm) piping: mine was shopbought; to make your own see page 16 50in (127cm) of 1in (2.5cm) wide bias binding

20in (51cm) nylon zip 2½in (6.5cm) and 4in (10cm) circle templates Strong wet fabric glue

### Cut

Two pieces of outer fabric and fusible fleece measuring 14 x 111/2in (35.5 x 29.25cm) for the front and back panels

Two pieces of lining measuring 14 x 121/2 in (35.5 x 31.75 cm) for the front and back panels

One piece each of outer fabric, lining and fusible fleece measuring 14 x 4in (35.5 x 10cm) for the base

Two pieces of outer fabric, lining and fusible fleece measuring 11½ x 6in (29.25 x 15.25cm) for the ends: measure 1in (2.5cm) from each bottom corner, and cut from here to the top corners to taper

Two pieces each of outer fabric, lining and fusible fleece measuring 4 x 11in (10 x 28cm) for the zip panel

Two pieces of outer fabric measuring 1½ x 3in (4 x 7.5cm) for the zip tabs

One outer and one lining fabric piece, each measuring 6 x 7in (15.25 x 18cm) for the patch pocket

Two outer and two lining strips of fabric for the handles, each measuring 2½ x 20in (6.5 x 51cm)




Fuse the fleece to the back of the outer front and back panels. Curve the bottom two corners of the outer and lining front and back pieces using your 4in (10cm) circle template. Sew a piece of piping, raw edges together, around the sides and bottom of the front and back pieces, starting and stopping 1½in (4cm) from the top. Turn the ends of the piping to the outside of the edge to make neat.

Sew a strip of piping across the top of the outer pocket piece.







12 Start with the bag inside out and the zip open. Pin the front lining piece right sides together to the front of the bag, by turning the bag and trapping the whole of the back of the bag and zip panel between the two pieces. Sew around the top and sides, leaving the bottom open. Turn right side out and you'll have a really neat seam with no raw edges showing. Repeat to attach the remaining lining to the back of the bag. Turn right side out.



13 Wrap the base lining fabric around the mesh bag base, fold the ends inwards and tack/baste.

14 Drizzle a little wet glue around the edge of the seam side of the base, then push inside the bag, being careful not to get glue onto the lining. The bottom seams should tuck under the bag base. If you prefer you could tack/baste this in place by hand when the glue is dry.

15 Take the remaining webbing; thread one end through the centre of the slider and sew. Take the opposite end through a swivel snap, back over the centre of the slider then through the second swivel snap and sew.
